COURSE OBJECTIVE

This is an advanced Corporate Finance course, which builds on your previous learning in the areas of Financial Management and Investments. The purpose of this course is to provide you with the tools to analyze, evaluate and design corporate restructuring programs, including mergers, acquisitions, LBOs, MBOs, leveraged recaps, and stock repurchases.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines the various forms of corporate restructuring, and how restructuring affects corporate values and control issues. Restructuring is broadly defined, and includes restructuring of liabilities (e.g., leveraged recapitalizations, LBOs), restructuring of assets (e.g., acquisitions, divestitures), or both (e.g., mergers accompanied by changes in capital structure). Important components of the course include valuation of a corporation and its securities (debt and equity), theoretical rationales for and empirical evidence on restructuring of assets and liabilities, and specific topics such as LBOs and stock repurchases. The course should be of interest to students planning careers in corporate finance and investment banking.

This is an advanced corporate finance course. It requires familiarity with number crunching and a solid understanding of the concepts of introductory finance, particularly capital budgeting and capital structure. The material includes a substantial amount of theory, and numerical examples are very important in illustrating the concepts to be covered in this course. The format will be predominantly synchronous and/or video lectures, supplemented by a set of cases. Class participation is strongly encouraged.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to complete the following key tasks:

- analyze the effect of any type of corporate restructuring on firm value;
- analyze the effect of corporate restructuring on the components of firm value – equity and debt;
- analyze how restructuring affects corporate control; and
- design a financing package for a restructuring proposal.

Avenue to Learn (A2L) Online Tests

There are three online tests in this course which account for **90%** of your final grade. The exam will cover material from the text book, readings, lectures and class discussion. These online tests will **NOT** cover case content material. These are **open-book** tests including multiple choice and short concept questions as well as problems.

- Students will need to sign in to A2L *quizzes and tests* within the limited time window allowed. Failing to sign in during the permitted time will result in missing the test with a mark of zero.
- The online test *may require video monitoring* of students during the length of the exam using university recommended software and students are expected to have access to a webcam, headset, and mic.
- Students will only be provided *one attempt* for each A2L online test and *must avoid “submit exam” while moving to the next page*. Such early submissions will be marked as is and *no additional attempt* will be provided. If a student is unable complete online test due to technical issues (such as screen freezing, power outage, etc.), student must contact the BComm office immediately.
