COURSE DESCRIPTION

Purchasing and supply costs and can be a significant part of a finished good' or service's cost, accounting for as much as 80% of manufacturing costs. Companies that have recognized the benefits of strategic procurement and spend analysis early are reaping the benefits: Royal Ahold saved \$350 million on direct procurement in two years by implementing a program that cost only \$1 million and GlaxoSmithKline has reported a staggering 5451% annual return on its sourcing programs!

Students will gain skills that are necessary to manage purchasing operations in the private and public sectors. Topics include: purchasing policies, procedures, supplier selection, order management (including quality, quantity, delivery and price decisions), spend analytics, negotiation and contract management, outsourcing, international procurement and sustainability issues. Relevant procurement components of SAP's enterprise resource planning system will be demonstrated. This course can be used towards SAP Certification in Business Integration.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to complete the following key tasks:

- ➤ Know the legal aspects of purchasing and ethics;
- Select and evaluate suppliers;
- Perform cost and pricing analytics;
- Bargain and negotiate procurement contracts;
- ➤ Be familiar with SAP related purchasing modules.

Assignments: 25% individually $(5 \times 5\%)$

- Each student will individually work on five assignments) which is 25% of the final grade. Each assignment submission is worth 5% of the final grade.

Case Studies: 20% group work (2 × 10%)

- Late case report submissions will not be marked. [http://avenue.mcmaster.ca]
- Each group will be required to submit a group written case report on each case study where the report includes 5% of the final grade. Written reports will be marked in groups.
- Each group will deliver a presentation on each case study where the presentation includes 5% of the final grade. The format of the presentation files (such as slide numbers, title page, headings, graphs and tables, transparency of info/analysis, etc.)

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will also be considered in marking this component. Presentations will be marked in groups.

- The case reports/presentations may include details of relevant problem statements, assumptions, data collection, qualitative/quantitative analyses, Excel screenshots, graphs, and recommendations.
- For written reports, each group should submit one single PDF file as the final written report.
- For presentations, each of the groups should submit one single presentation file (e.g., a PPT file) and one video file or link to video file.
- Each PDF file (maximum 5 pages, single-spacing, Times New Roman 11, one-inch margins) should include a short section that shows the details of the meetings/discussions that take place between the members as well as their time/conceptual/theoretical contributions to the case report.
- ➤ Each verbal report (the presentation file) should contain all necessary information/analyses, as we may not mark the corresponding Excel spreadsheet.

Tests and Final Exam - 55% individually (10% +15% +30%))

Tests and final exams are mandatory. All exams may include true/false, multiple choice, short essay, mini-cases, and/or calculation-based questions. *All problems with grades must be reported within 1 week of the posting of grades.* Test 1 is worth 10%, Test 2 15%, and the final exam 30%.
